

REPORT TITLE: CIL FUNDING APPLICATION FOR NEW ROAD PLAYING FIELD,  
SWANMORE

17 MAY 2018

REPORT OF PORTFOLIO HOLDER FOR BUILT ENVIRONMENT: Cllr Brook

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WARD(S): SWANMORE

PURPOSE

A project has come forward this year in Swanmore to improve the quality and usability of the recreation ground at New Road. The works proposed include a 100m running track, 500m circuit for runners/joggers, new skate park, car park extension and toilet facilities. The only time that improvement works can be undertaken at this site is during the summer period from April - September as the playing fields are the home of a local junior football club and are used extensively throughout the season.

In June 2016, the Council agreed a protocol for the allocation of its retained Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funds through the development of a rolling 3 year programme (CAB2529) which would align with the Council's annual budget setting process. However, there are cases where schemes are identified where timing is an issue and need to be considered outside this process. A previous example of this is the Durngate Flood Defence Scheme which was considered and approved in July 2017 (CAB2940).

Considering this project as part of the usual CIL funding report in September will effectively delay work by a year. In order to avoid this and move the project forward in a more timely fashion it is recommended that CIL funding be agreed now in order to finalise the funding for the whole project and enable its implementation.

The total cost of the project is c£413k of which Swanmore Parish Council already have confirmed funding of c£228k. The Parish Council are therefore seeking funding for the balance of £185k. The scheme has planning permission and has been tendered and is waiting agreement on funding before it can proceed.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That Cabinet approve £185k of the City Council's General Fund share of Community Infrastructure Levy to be allocated as a capital grant to Swanmore Parish Council for improvements to the recreation ground in New Road, Swanmore, and that an appropriate funding agreement is put in place with the Parish Council regarding the use and release of these funds which will enable the infrastructure to be delivered.
2. That Cabinet approve, in accordance with Financial Procedure Rule 6.4(b), authority to incur the expenditure of £185k subject to conditions that will be set out in the funding agreement.

## IMPLICATIONS:

### 1 COUNCIL STRATEGY OUTCOME

- 1.1 Outcome Three of the Council Strategy 2017-2020 (refresh February 2018) is to improve the health and happiness of our community. The Strategy states that we want to focus on reducing inequalities and improving our community's health and happiness particularly through sport and other types of activity. The improvement of the facilities proposed and, in particular, the creation of the running and jogging track at New Road Playing Fields will help to deliver this. The consultation carried out by the parish council indicates that these facilities will result in an increased use of the site.

### 2 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 2.1 In order to support this scheme it is recommended that £185k of the Council's District wide CIL funds are allocated as a capital grant to assist with the delivery of the project. Total CIL income received and retained by the City Council General Fund is approximately £3.5m. To date, approximately £925k has been spent or committed to projects across the District.
- 2.2 The total cost of the project is £413k of which the parish council already have confirmed funding of £228k through Open Space Funding and Swanmore Parish Council's own CIL funds (neighbourhood portion). The district CIL contribution would fund the balance of £185k.
- 2.3 All revenue and maintenance costs will be met by Swanmore Parish Council through their Open Space and Amenities budget.

### 3 LEGAL AND PROCUREMENT IMPLICATIONS

- 3.1 Procurement of the scheme has been undertaken by Swanmore Parish Council. A funding agreement will need to be agreed with the parish council to control the use and release of the funds.

- 4.1 None

### 5 PROPERTY AND ASSET IMPLICATIONS

- 5.1 All revenue and maintenance costs will be met by Swanmore Parish Council through their Open Space and Amenities budget.

### 6 CONSULTATION AND COMMUNICATION

- 6.1 An extensive public consultation exercise has led to the development of the proposals and a summary table of the consultation results is included at Appendix A.

- 6.2 There has been a good response to the recent online surveys with over 200 people completing the skate park survey, 87% of whom live in Swanmore or the surrounding villages. 208 respondents confirmed that they would use the newly designed park and over 138 users would visit the park a minimum of once a week. Over 320 people completed the survey about the running tracks, 92% of whom live in Swanmore or the surrounding villages. Over 100 people confirmed they would use the tracks at least once of week. A survey on the need for specialist toilet facilities received responses from 19 people with complex disabilities living in close proximity that would benefit from actually being able to use the site; increasing their ability to be active, engage with other young people and join in with family activities.
- 6.3 Officers have also consulted with the ward members and Portfolio Holder Built Environment and they are supportive of the scheme.

## 7 ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS

- 7.1 The provision of additional parking will reduce congestion in the area as there are over 100 metres of parked cars on New Road when home football matches are being played.

## 11 SUPPORTING INFORMATION:

11.1 At Cabinet in June 2016 a spending protocol for CIL was agreed and was summarised in table 1 of that report (CAB2807). This involves a rolling 3 year

programme of schemes with spending commitment to projects in year 1 and indicative funding commitments to the projects in years 2 and 3. A report setting out the proposed programme, which will recommend schemes which can be funded using CIL income, will be considered by Cabinet each September. The current programme was agreed by Cabinet in September 2017 (CAB2962).

- 11.2 A project by the parish council has come forward this year in Swanmore to improve the quality and usability of the recreation ground at New Road to ensure that all user groups benefit from a varied range of interesting recreational activities and enhanced site infrastructure that helps to meet the needs of the local population. An extensive public consultation exercise undertaken by the parish council has led to the development of proposals that include a spray concrete skate park, a 4-lane 100m running track and a 500m jogging / cycle path, an extension to the car park and the addition of toilet facilities.
- 11.3 It is understood that Swanmore Primary School has confirmed they would use the new facilities proposed for the site at least twice a week. Swanmore College is situated to the north of the Recreation Ground and they have been involved in the development of the project and assisted with the consultation process. They recognise the benefit the new facilities would provide for young people for training purposes and the amount of use the facility would receive from their pupils. Swanmore College has a large catchment area and in addition to neighbouring parishes also caters for pupils from Curdrige, Curbridge, Durley, Droxford, Soberton, Soberton Heath and North Boarhunt. There is also scope for engagement with other schools and groups with St John the Baptist Primary School only 1.5 miles from the site, Bishops Waltham Infant and Junior Schools less than 2 miles away and 3 preschools within metres of the site.
- 11.4 The total cost of the project is £413k of which the parish council already have confirmed funding of £228k from Swanmore's Open Space Fund and their CIL allocation (neighbourhood portion). The contribution from the District wide CIL fund would be the balance of £185k. The project has planning permission and has been tendered by the parish council and is only waiting therefore for agreement on funding before commencement.
- 11.5 The playing fields are the home of Waltham Wolves Football Club and are used extensively throughout the season. This means that the only time that the works can be undertaken at this site is during the period before the football season starts in September. Considering this project as part of the CIL report in September, when the rolling 3 year funding programme is due to be considered by Cabinet, will delay the scheme by a year (this is likely to increase costs). In order to avoid this delay, this report has been prepared for Cabinet consideration now and it is recommended that £185k of CIL funding be agreed to finalise the funding of this project to enable its implementation in 2018.

- 11.6 The agreed CIL Spending Protocol gives priority to infrastructure in the Regulation 123 List and Infrastructure Delivery Plan (IDP). The IDP was updated in connection with the Winchester District Local Plan Part 2 – Development Management and Site Allocations (LPP2) - and this builds on the work carried out before for the Local Plan Part 1 Joint Core Strategy and CIL charging schedule.
- 11.7 It is considered that the scheme broadly aligns with three categories identified in the Regulation 123 list:
- **Open Space Provision** - Provision of facilities for addressing open space deficiencies in terms of quantity, quality or accessibility, particularly those set out in the Winchester City Council (WCC) Open Space Strategy.\*
  - **Built facilities Indoor Sport and recreational facilities** - Provision of facilities to address deficiencies in indoor and built sports, recreation or leisure facilities in accordance with LPP1 Policy CP7; particularly those identified in the WCC Built Facilities study.
  - **Community and cultural facilities** - Provision of new facilities for community use and improvements to existing facilities in deficiency areas as identified in the Cultural Strategy, Built Facilities Study or Infrastructure Delivery Plan.
- 11.8 The Infrastructure Delivery Plan in relation to Swanmore highlights a “need for open space provision, especially for children’s play, allotments, informal open space and parks, with the distribution of some types of open space also being uneven.” Whilst the proposed infrastructure may not reduce shortfalls, it will improve the quality of the facilities available to local communities in a part of the District where the population is rising because of planned new housing development.
- 11.9 Furthermore this scheme would meet other objectives for CIL funding set out in the agreed protocol which explains how spending will be prioritised by the City Council. The proposed enhancements to the site would help to support sustainable communities, address the impact of new development beyond that which has been secured by planning obligations, contribute towards the delivery of infrastructure by an infrastructure provided (in this case the parish council) where it may otherwise not be delivered (or not in its current form/timescale) and would be in accordance with wider corporate objectives including Outcome Three of the Council Strategy (improve the health and happiness of our community).
- 11.10 In conclusion, it is considered that the improvements to the playing fields at New Road, Swanmore align well with infrastructure identified in the R123 List and is the type of infrastructure that can be supported by District wide CIL funds as it meets many of the prioritisation criteria set out within the agreed protocol for fund allocation. The enhanced facilities will benefit the local community which is expanding both in Swanmore itself and adjoining settlements, such as Waltham Chase, where housing planned in the Council’s adopted Local Plan has, or is now being, built (see Appendix B). Without a

contribution from CIL, the works will be significantly delayed and may not be able to be implemented at all (or not in the current form) which would have a significant impact on Swanmore and the neighbouring parishes. It is therefore recommended that £185k be allocated now as a contribution towards the total cost of the scheme to enable the project to be delivered in 2018.

## 12 OTHER OPTIONS CONSIDERED AND REJECTED

- 12.1 The alternative is to not provide a CIL contribution to the costs of the playing field project and these funds could be used for other infrastructure projects elsewhere but there is a real risk that the project would not be able to proceed or at least in its current form/timescale.. In the absence of alternative funding to complete this project the parish council may have to consider delivering the project in phases resulting in the cost of the project increasing significantly.
- 12.2 Other sources of funding have been considered, including an application to Sport England, but unfortunately this was not successful due to the funding stream being oversubscribed.

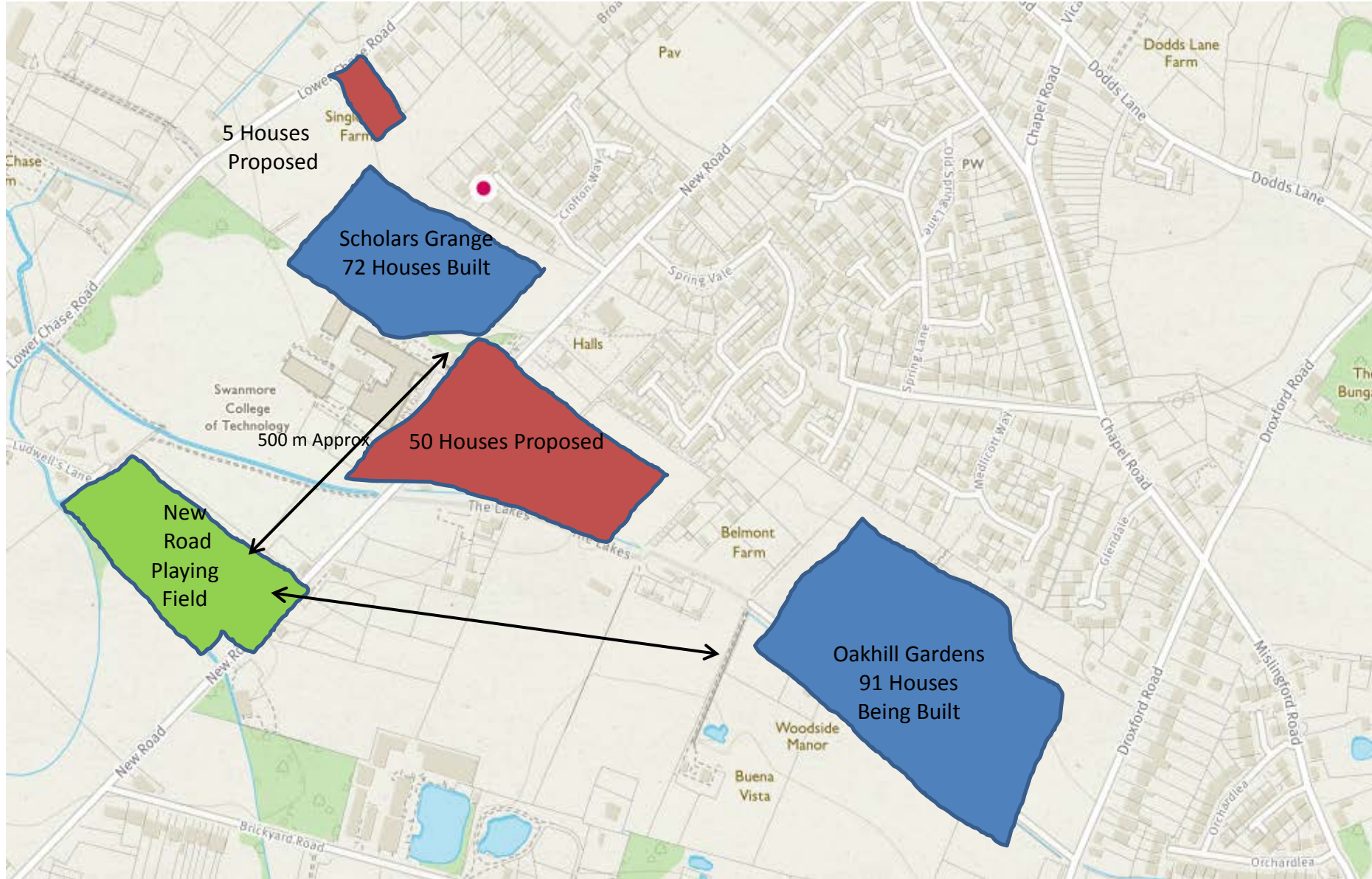
