The Winchester Town Forum meeting scheduled for 20 March would now be held on 21 March 2013.

# 4. <u>DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS</u>

The Corporate Director (Governance) reported that, with the exception of Councillor Wright, all Members had requested a dispensation in respect of any disclosable pecuniary interest they had in relation to the Council's annual budget and/or Council Tax debate.

With regard to Councillor Wright, he had indicated that he had not applied for a dispensation as a Council Tax payer within the District (re. the Council tax debate), as he considered that it was an over-cautious interpretation of the Localism Act 2011 and unnecessary. He participated and voted accordingly.

The Corporate Director (Governance) confirmed that a recent ministerial letter had expressed a view similar to Councillor Wright's position, but a number of local authorities had taken the precautionary approach of using the dispensation provisions in the Act, for the avoidance of any doubt. The Department of Communities and Local Government was considering updating the Guidance, but that was not yet available.

Councillors Collin, Mason and Stallard declared disclosable pecuniary interests in respect of all matters arising in the meeting which may involve the County Council, as they were County Councillors. Councillor Godfrey made the same declaration but as a County Council employee.

The Corporate Director (Governance) confirmed that, having also established that there would be no material conflict of interest, all Members having made the above declarations would be permitted to remain in the room, speak and vote under the dispensation granted on behalf of the Standards Committee.

- 2. That it be noted that at its meeting on 09 January 2013 the Council calculated the Council Tax Base for 2013/14
- (a) 45,392.95 being the amount calculated by the Council for the whole Council area, in accordance with Section 31B (Item T) of the Local Government Act 1992, as amended (the "Act"), as its Council Tax base for the year.
- (b) for dwellings in those parts of its area to which a Parish/Town precept relates as in the attached Annex 1.
- 3. Calculate that the Council Tax requirement for the Council's own purposes for 2013/14 (excluding Parish Precepts) is £6,524,147
- 4. That the following amounts be now calculated by the Council for the year 2013/14 in accordance with Sections 31 to 36 of the Act:
- (a) £105,259,231 being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(2) of the Act taking into account all precepts issued to it by Parish Councils.
- (b) £96,527,082 being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(3) of the Act.
- (c) £8,732,149 being the amount by which the aggregate at 4(a) above exceeds the aggregate at 4(b) above, calculated by the Council in accordance with Section 31A(4) of the Act, as its Council Tax requirement for the year. (Item R in the formula in Section 31B of the Act).
- (d) £192.37 being the amount at 4(c) above (Item R), all divided by Item T (2(a) above), calculated by the Council, in accordance with Section 31B(1) of the Act, as the basic amount of its Council Tax for the year (including Parish Precepts).

- (e) £3,000,381 being the aggregate amount of all special items referred to in Section 34(1) of the Act (as per the attached Annex 2)
- £126.27 being the amount at 4(d) above less the result given by dividing the amount at 4(e) above by Item T (2(a) above), calculated by the Council, in accordance with Section 34(2) of the Act, as the basic amount of its Council Tax for the year for dwellings in those parts of its area to which no special item relates.
- 5. That it be noted for the year 2013/14, the Hampshire County Council, the Police and Crime Commissioner Hampshire and the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Authority have stated the following amounts in precepts issued to the Council, in accordance with Section 40 of the Local Government Finance Act 1992, for each of the categories of dwellings shown below:
