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1. **MINUTES**

Council noted that due to a typographical error, the attendance for the previous three meetings of Council held on 8 January 2014, 6 November 2013 and 17 July 2013 had incorrectly listed Councillor Mason twice and had excluded Councillor Pearson, who had been present on all occasions.

**RESOLVED:**

That, subject to the above correction, the minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Council held on 8 January 2014 be approved and adopted.

**2. COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR**

The Mayor informed Council of the recent death of Canon Michael St John Channell and reported that he had written to his immediate family expressing the Council's condolences. The funeral was to be held on Friday 14 March at 10.30am in the Cathedral and a Service of Thanksgiving was to also be arranged for a later date.

The Mayor reported that the 'Swimathon' scheduled to be held at Winchester College on Saturday 22 February had been cancelled due to flooding in the vicinity. It was hoped the event could be rearranged for a future date.

The Mayor also referred to a production of Peter and the Wolf to be held in the Cathedral on Friday 14 March at 7.30pm and reported that tickets were available from the Cathedral, the Tourist Information Centre or from him.

The Mayor then drew Council's attention to the Mayor's Ball for this year which was to take the form of an Ambassadors Ball and was to be held in the Guildhall on Friday 11 April.

Finally, the Mayor referred to the continuing work of the Council, Hampshire Fire & Rescue Service, Hampshire Highways, the Police, the Environment Agency and the Armed Forces with regard to the on-going flooding situation across the District. The Council joined the Mayor in thanking the respective agencies for the immense amount of coordinated work undertaken.

**3. COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE LEADER**

The Leader addressed Council on the City's response to the flooding situation across the District. His statement is set out as Appendix A to the minutes.

On behalf of their respective groups, Councillors Learney and Pines also thanked the Council, partner agencies and local communities for their collective response in dealing with the flooding.

Councillor Humby explained how the Council would work to support local businesses impacted by flooding over the medium and longer-term.

Council was reminded that due to senior officers being heavily engaged in flood response work, there would be no formal questions under Council Procedure Rule 14. Accordingly, since its publication, agenda item 4 had been deleted. Instead, the Leader answered questions from Members on the flooding and how recovery would be arranged for those areas affected and future regard to any lessons learnt. Members also offered their

congratulations to all involved on the coordinated approach in dealing with the situation.

At conclusion of discussion, it was agreed that The Overview and Scrutiny Committee establish an Informal Scrutiny Group (ISG) to consider lessons learnt from the flooding, including instances of good practice (such as Flood Response Plans and the coordinated work of partner agencies) and other ideas from across the District that have helped deal with the situation. The ISG should not convene until after the response work had concluded.

RESOLVED:

That The Overview and Scrutiny Committee establish a Flooding Informal Scrutiny Group (ISG) with terms of reference and membership to be agreed in due course.

#### 4. **DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS**

Having regard to their roles as Hampshire County Councillors, Councillors Humby, Huxstep, Mather, Stallard and Tod each declared a disclosable pecuniary interest in any matter on the agenda which may have a County Council involvement. Councillor Godfrey made the same declaration due to his role as a County Council employee. However, as there was no material conflict of interest, they all remained in the room under the dispensation granted on behalf of the Standards Committee, to participate and vote in all such matters.

Councillor Lipscomb declared a personal, but not prejudicial, interest in the Budget and Council Tax 2014/15. This was because of his involvement in the management committee of Hampshire Air Ambulance. He participated and voted in debate, as any decision upon a grant for the Air Ambulance would be a matter for Cabinet to determine.

#### 5. **CONSIDERATION OF RECOMMENDED MINUTES**

All of the following minutes were attached to either Report CL92 or CL93. Both reports were circulated with Supplementary Agendas after the statutory deadline. The Mayor decided to accept both reports and all the attached minutes onto the agenda, as matters requiring urgent consideration, in view of the need to approve the Council's budget for 2014/15 at this meeting.

Budget and Council Tax 2014/15

“That in order to assist those most in need in the community, protect public health, combat climate change and create long term budget savings, Recommendation 2 be amended by the addition of the following words

....subject to the following changes:

- a) That in order to assist those most in need in the District
  - i. £60,000 be made available in each of the next two years for fuel poverty reduction.
  - ii. That Council confirm any additional income from textile recycling be used to support Community Groups and add £40,000 to the grants budget subject to the receipt of that income.
- b) That no increase be made to pest control fees.
- c) That Council implement the recommendations of the Carbon Reduction ISG and create both a £30,000 energy savings fund and reduce the costs of lease cars for staff by a minimum of £25,000 in 2015/16 and £50,000 in 2016/17 reducing the City Council's energy use and costs.
- d) That these changes be funded by a reduction in the contribution to the Business Rates Reserve of £150,000 for the next two years.”

After some debate, the Mayor agreed to a short recess, to allow Members an opportunity to consider the amendment within their respective political groups.

The meeting recommenced and the Leader of the Council, Councillor Wood, explained that if the proposer and seconder were prepared to withdraw their amendment, he would propose a further amendment.

On the basis of the Leader's statement, the proposer and seconder of the amendment (Councillors Learney and Evans respectively) agreed to withdraw their amendment.

Amendment (1) Councillor Wood (2) Councillor Learney

“Recommendation 2 be amended by the addition of the following words

....subject to the following changes

That in order to assist those most in need in the District, £60,000 be made available in each of the next two years for fuel poverty reduction measures and that an Informal Scrutiny Group be appointed to recommend how to allocate the funds (to be funded from the Major Investment Reserves).”

In accordance with recent Government Guidance on Recorded Votes at Budget Meetings, the Mayor decided that a recorded vote be taken in respect of the amendment.

- (h) Community Wardens;
- (i) Arboricultural work;

2. That it be noted that the Head of Revenues, in consultation with the Chief Finance Officer, calculated the Council Tax Base for 2014/15 at

- (a) 45,761.97 being the amount calculated by the Council for the whole Council area, in accordance with Section 31B (Item T) of the Local Government Act 1992, as amended (the "Act"), as its Council Tax base for the year.

- (b) for dwellings in those parts of its area to which a Parish/Town precept relates as in the attached Annex 1.

3. Calculate that the Council Tax requirement for the Council's own purposes for 2014/15 (excluding Parish Precepts) is £6,573,625.

4. That the following amounts be now calculated by the Council for the year 2014/15 in accordance with Sections 31 to 36 of the Act:

- (a) £109,304,244 being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(2) of the Act taking into account all precepts issued to it by Parish Councils.
- (b) £100,457,962 being the aggregate of the amounts which the Council estimates for the items set out in Section 31A(3) of the Act.
- (c) £8,846,282 being the amount by which the aggregate at 4(a) above exceeds the aggregate at 4(b) above, calculated by the Council in accordance with Section 31A(4) of the Act, as its Council Tax requirement for the year. (Item R in the formula in Section 31B of the Act).
- (d) £193.31 being the amount at 4(c) above (Item R), all divided by Item T (2(a) above), calculated by the Council, in accordance with Section 31B(1) of the Act, as the basic amount of its Council Tax for the year (including Parish Precepts).
- (e) £3,067,918 being the aggregate amount of all special items referred to in Section 34(1) of the Act (as per the attached Annex 2)
- (f) £126.27 being the amount at 4(d) above less the result given by dividing the amount at 4(e) above by Item T (2(a) above), calculated by the Council, in accordance with Section 34(2) of the Act, as the basic amount of its Council Tax for the year for dwellings in those parts of its area to which no special item relates.

5. That it be noted for the year 2014/15, the Hampshire County Council, the Police and Crime Commissioner - Hampshire and the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Authority have stated the following amounts in precepts issued to the Council, in accordance with Section 40 of the Local Government Finance Act 1992, for each of the categories of dwellings shown below:
