2. **COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE MAYOR**

The Mayor announced that she had received over 70 nominations for the Mayor's Awards for 2015/16. The event would be held in the Bapsy Hall on Wednesday 2 March at 6pm.

The Mayor also drew Members' attention to forthcoming Charities events. Tomorrow evening was a Charities Race Night at the Wickham Community Centre. On Friday 15 April, it was the Mayor's Charity Quiz Night and on Friday 11 March it was the Masked Ball, both to be held in the Guildhall. There was to be a St Patrick's Evening to be held in Green's Restaurant, Wickham on Thursday 17 March. There were also various Charities talks in Abbey House.

3. **COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE LEADER**

The Leader announced that he was looking at the best way to implement the recommendations of the Claer Lloyd-Jones Independent Review. It was proposed that The Overview and Scrutiny Committee and the Audit Committee would look in-depth at each of the learning points - matters related to governance and risk and those recommendations that related to the Council's scrutiny function. There was a need to coordinate work to implement improvements and so an Informal Policy Group (IPG) would consider these in a timely manner and report to Council in due course. He proposed that the IPG would be comprised of Councillors Simon Cook, Cutler, Thompson, Weston and himself. Other Members may be called in to support where necessary. It was expected that the IPG would hold its first meeting some time after the next Audit Committee and report its programme of work to full Council.

The Leader also drew to Members' attention that the Council had recently been served notice by SW1 of a range of legal challenges against the Council's decisions to terminate the Silver Hill contract and to not implement the CPO. He advised that he had asked officers to check the Council's legal position with regard to this. A Special Cabinet meeting would be held on 10 March 2016 to review legal advice so that an initial response could be made to SW1. Finally, the Leader announced that from this coming Monday, Councillor Burns would join Cabinet (with no portfolio) for a three week period, with her special interest in this matter and legal expertise.

4. <u>DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY INTERESTS</u>

Having regard to their roles as Hampshire County Councillors, Councillors Humby, Huxstep, Mather, Stallard and Tod each declared a disclosable pecuniary interest in any matter on the agenda which may have a County Council involvement. Councillor Godfrey made the same declaration due to his role as a County Council employee as did Councillor Thacker, whose husband was a Hampshire County Councillor. However, as there were no material

conflicts of interest, they all remained in the room under the dispensation granted on behalf of the Standards Committee, to participate and vote in all such matters.

Councillor Gottlieb declared a personal, but not prejudicial interest in items of business on the agenda that related to the Silver Hill development proposals due to him being a member of the Winchester Deserves Better campaign group.

Councillor Byrnes declared a personal, but not prejudicial interest in respect of agenda item 6 a) as he was related to the head fund raiser of the Trinity Centre. Councillor Thompson also declared a personal, but not prejudicial interest in respect of agenda item 6 a) as she was a trustee of the Carrol Centre, Winchester. However, as was explained by the Chief Operating Officer, the detailed discussion of the individual grants had previously taken place at Cabinet and unless there were any detailed questions on the specific grants in question, both Members were able to remain in the room to participate and vote.

Councillor Gosling declared a disclosable pecuniary interest in respect of agenda item 6 b) as he rented a garage from the Council. However, as there were no material conflicts of interest, he remained in the room under the dispensation granted on behalf of the Standards Committee, to participate and vote.
