Application to Vary the Premises Licence for:

Crown Inn The Square Bishops Waltham

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#### Part A.

### 1. Application

**Applicant:** Punch Taverns Plc

**Premises:** Crown Inn, Bishops Waltham

### Conversion of the Existing Licence/s.

The conversion of the existing licence(s) was granted under delegated powers on 30 August 2005.

The current permitted hours are;

Monday to Saturday 1100 to 2300

Sunday and Good Friday 1200 to 2230

Christmas Day 1200 to 1500

1900 to 2230

New Year's Eve 1100 to 2300 1 January

The premises hold a Public Entertainment Licence for the hours shown above.

#### **Application for Variation.**

The application is for variation of the Premises Licence during the Transitional Period under Schedule 8 paragraph 7(b) of the Licensing Act 2003, to extend the hours when the premises are open to the public, for the sale of alcohol and regulated entertainment.

Notice of the application was displayed outside of the premises for a period of 28 days until 16 August 2005, and advertised in the Hampshire Chronicle on 29 July 2005.

The Operating Schedule, copied at Appendix 1, proposes the Relevant Licensable Activities as:

New Year's Eve 0800 to 0000/0100

1/2 January

### 4. Hours Premises Open To The Public (O)

Sunday to Wednesday 0800 to 0030

Thursday, Friday, Saturday 0800 to 0130

New Year's Eve 0800 to 0030/0130

1/2 January

The above times to be extended by one hour on May, Spring, and August Bank Holiday weekends.

The above times to be extended by one hour on Maundy Thursday to Easter Monday.

The above times to be extended by one hour on Christmas Eve and Boxing Day.

To open at 0600 to 1000 for the sale of alcohol and provision of food during rugby and football World Cup matches, and British Lions matches.

The Police have made representations regarding the later hours especially on a Sunday, and have recommended some conditions which should be added to the licence. These are shown in Appendix 2.1.

### 3. <u>Interested Parties</u>

### 4. Observations

The Sub-Committee is obliged to determine this application with a view to promoting the Licensing Objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

In making its decision, the Sub-Committee is also obliged to have regard to the National Guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee must have regard to all of the representations.

The Sub-Committee must take such of the following steps it considers necessary to promote the Licensing Objectives:

- 1. Grant the application as per the application, or
- 2. Modify the conditions of the licence by alteration or addition, or
- 3. Reject the whole or part of the application.

Decisions made under 2 or 3 above must actually be necessary to promote the Licensing Objectives.

#### Terminal hours.

The Sub-Committee should take account of the National Guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy with regard to terminal hours and take such steps as it considers necessary to promote the Licensing Objectives.

(Licensing Policy A8)

#### Licensing Objectives.

#### Crime and Disorder

The Sub-Committee should consider any necessary conditions to prevent crime and public disorder relating to the premises having regard to the observations of the Police.

(Licensing Policy 1.6, 2.11, 2.17)

### Public Safety

The Sub-Committee should consider any necessary conditions relating to public safety having regard the Council's Licensing Policy.

(Licensing Policy B3, B4)

#### **Public Nuisance**

The Sub-Committee should consider any necessary conditions to prevent public nuisance caused by noise pollution from the premises having regard to the observations of the Police.

(Licensing Policy Section C)

### Protection of Children

The Sub-Committee should consider any necessary conditions for the Protection of Children having regard to the observations of the Police and the Operating Schedule.

(Licensing Policy D6, D7)

### **Human Rights**

It is considered that Articles 6 (right to a fair trial) 8 (right to respect for private and family life) and Article 1 of the First Protocol (right to peaceable enjoyment of possessions) may be relevant. As there is a right of appeal to the Magistrates' Court, it is considered that there would be no infringement of Article 6. Article 8 is relevant, insofar as the nearby residents could claim that this right would be infringed by disturbance from customers. This should be balanced against the applicants' right to use of their premises under Article 1 of the First Protocol. Interference with these rights is permitted, where this interference is lawful, necessary in a democratic society, and proportionate. Likewise, the residents may argue that their rights under Article 1 of the First Protocol would be infringed. If conditions are imposed, there should be no interference with any convention rights. To the extent that any interference may occur, it would be justifiable in a democratic society, and proportionate.

### 5. Conditions

### **Mandatory Conditions**

Under the Licensing Act 2003, the following conditions must be imposed on the Premises Licence in any event:-

- No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- 3. Where individuals are required on premises to carry out security activities, they must be licensed by the Security Industry Authority.

### **Possible Conditions**

If the application is granted, the Sub-Committee may wish to consider the following conditions to reflect the Operating Schedule:

### **Operating Hours**

1. The hours the premises may open for other than Licensable Activities shall be:

(i)	Sunday to Wednesday	0800 to 0030
(ii)	Thursday, Friday, Saturday	0800 to 0130
(iii)	New Year's Eve	0800 to 0030/0130 1/2 January

2. The hours the premises may be used for the sale of alcohol shall be:

(i)	Sunday to Wednesday	1000 to 0000
(ii)	Thursday, Friday, Saturday	1000 to 0100
(iii)	New Year's Eve	1000 to 0000/0100 1/2 January

The above times to be extended by one hour on May, Spring, and August Bank Holiday weekends.

The above times to be extended by one hour on Maundy Thursday to Easter Monday.

The above times to be extended by one hour on Christmas Eve and Boxing Day.

To open at 0600 to 1000 for the sale of alcohol and provision of food during rugby and football World Cup matches, and British Lions matches.

- 3. The hours the premises may be used for regulated entertainment shall be:
  - (i) Live Music, Recorded Music, Dancing, Karaoke. **Sunday to Saturday** 1000 to 0000

### **All Licensing Objectives**

#### **Crime and Disorder**

- 1. There shall be a 30 minute "wind down period" at the end of the period for the sale of alcohol.
- 2. The premises shall be a member of a local Pubwatch scheme if available
- 3. All external walkways and car parking areas shall be illuminated during the hours of darkness up to 30 minutes after the premises close.
- 4. The licence holder shall install a CCTV system in the premises to the satisfaction of the Police before the premises are first used under this Licence.
- 5. Hot food shall be provided up until 30 minutes before the closure of the premises.

### **Public Safety**

None.

### **Public Nuisance**

- 1. Whilst music is being played as part of regulated entertainment, the licensee or appointed member of staff shall check periodically that noise levels are acceptable. Such monitoring shall be carried out at the boundary of the premises to ensure that local residents are not likely to be disturbed.
- 2. Prominent, clear notices shall be displayed at all exits requesting customers to respect the needs of local residents, to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 3. Staff shall be given appropriate instructions and training to encourage customers to leave the premises quietly and not to loiter in the vicinity of the premises so as to minimize disturbance to local residents.
- 4. Regulated entertainment shall be restricted to the inside of the premises.
- 5. All regulated entertainment shall cease at 0000 hours.
- 6. All doors and windows that are capable of being opened directly to the outside of the premises shall not be kept open whilst the premises are in use for the purposes of regulated entertainment.
- 7. The garden shall be vacated by customers at 2300 hours.

8. Local taxi company telephone numbers shall be prominently displayed on the premises near exits and the licensee shall liaise with taxi firms to alleviating possible disturbance.

#### **Protection of Children**

- 1. The premises shall adopt and implement the Hampshire Constabulary's Challenge 21 Scheme.
- 2. No unaccompanied children shall be permitted to be on the premises.
- 3. No children shall permitted to be on the premises after 2100 hours.

#### **Embedded Restrictions**

1. The embedded restrictions included in the provisions of the Licensing Act 1964, the Children and Young Persons Act 1933 and the Cinematograph (Safety) Regulations 1955 shall apply.

### **Informatives**

The following measures are recommended to the Licensee, but are not being suggested as conditions, and would not be enforceable under the Licensing Act. In many cases, however, they may be requirements under other legislation.

- 1. All doors on escape routes should be free from fastenings, or if fitted should only be simple fastenings that can be readily operated from the side approached by people making an escape. The operation of these fastenings should be without the use of a key and without having to manipulate more than one mechanism.
- 2. Periodic inspection certificates should be kept on the premises for the emergency lighting, fire fighting equipment, and fire alarm and detection system.
- 3. Copies of fire test results on any fabrics should be held on the premises for inspection if required.
- 4. If the premises are not fitted with a fire alarm and detection system then a written procedure for raising the alarm should be kept on the premises.
