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### Part A.

### 1. Application

**Applicant:** Head of Environment, Winchester City Council

**Premises:** Prince of Wales, High Street, Shirrell Heath

- 1.1 This application by the Head of Environment, Winchester City Council is for the review of the Premises Licence for the Prince of Wales public house under Sections 51, 52 and 53 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The reason for the review relates to the prevention of public nuisance licensing objective following complaints of noise from the premises.
- 1.3 It also relates to the public safety licensing objective where patrons of the premises congregate outside and adjacent to the road in order to smoke. The Head of Environment observed that the proximity of this area to the main road could be a source of danger to those persons.
- 1.4 The premises licence is held by Osprey Pubs Limited and the Designated Premises Supervisor is currently Wayne Tiller.
- 1.5 The licence was converted from a Justices Licence in November 2005. During the transitional period, the licence was varied at a hearing of the Licensing Sub-Committee on 21 September 2005 by the then licence holder, Greene King Brewing & Retailing Ltd, to include entertainment and to increase the trading hours. (Report LR 135 refers)
- 1.6 As a result of complaints, the premises were visited on Friday 13 April 2007 by Mrs Abigail Toms, Environmental Health Officer, and PC Gary Miller, a Licensing Officer for Hampshire Constabulary, where the issues surrounding noise were discussed. A letter was sent to the Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Tiller, by Mrs Toms on 16 April 2007 following that visit. The Licensing and Registration Manager also sent a letter on 20 April 2007. These letters can be seen at Appendix 4.
- 1.7 Mrs Toms and the Licensing and Registration Manager visited a neighbouring house at 2130 on Friday 10 August 2007. Music was clearly audible inside the premises, particularly the base beat, in a room with the window and door closed. They then visited the premises at 2200 and found that the front door to the premises was open and there was a disco taking place in the function room.
- 1.8 The Designated Premises Supervisor, Mr Tiller, was spoken to and the noise escape was pointed out to him. He was also advised to comply with the conditions attached to the licence, namely "all external doors and windows must be kept closed other than for access and egress, in all rooms when events involving amplified music or speech are taking place" and "no activity shall take place in the garden after 2130."

- 1.9 The Licensing and Registration Manager sent letters to the Designated Premises Supervisor and the premises licence holder reinforcing the purpose of the visit, on 13 August 2007. These letters can be seen at Appendix 4.
- 1.10 The Head of Environment submitted an application for a review of the premises licence on 13 August 2007.
- 1.11 Notice of the application was displayed outside of the premises for a period of 28 days until 12 September 2007, and advertised by way of public notice on the Winchester City Council website.
- 1.12 Representations have been received from three interested parties with concerns relating to nuisance and safety, and one in support of the premises. These letters are attached at Appendix 3.
- 1.13 A letter was received from prospective tenants of the premises. This letter is attached at Appendix 4b.
- 1.14 Notices of the hearing were sent to all Parties on 13 September 2007.

# 4. Observations

The Sub-Committee is obliged to determine this application for a review with a view to promoting the following Licensing Objectives:

- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance

In making its decision, the Sub-Committee is also obliged to have regard to the National Guidance and the Council's Licensing Policy.

The Sub-Committee must have regard to all of the representations.

The Sub-Committee must take such of the following steps it considers necessary to promote the Licensing Objectives:

- 1. Modify the conditions attached to the licence either permanently or for a period not exceeding three months.
- 2. Exclude a licensable activity either permanently or for a period not exceeding three months.
- 3. Remove the Designated Premises Supervisor.
- 4. Suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months.
- Revoke the licence.

If the Sub-Committee decides that none of the above measures are necessary, they may take no action.

# Licensing Objectives.

### Public Safety

The Sub-Committee may consider any necessary conditions relating to public safety having regard to the observations of the Head of Environment and the Interested Parties.

(Licensing Policy B3, B4)

### Public Nuisance

The Sub-Committee should consider any necessary conditions to prevent public nuisance caused by noise pollution from the premises having regard to the observations of the Head of Environment, the Police and the Interested Parties.

(Licensing Policy Section C)

# **Human Rights**

It is considered that Articles 6 (right to a fair trial) 8 (right to respect for private and family life) and Article 1 of the First Protocol (right to peaceable enjoyment of possessions) may be relevant. As there is a right of appeal to the Magistrates' Court, it is considered that there would be no infringement of Article 6. Article 8 is relevant, insofar as the nearby residents could claim that this right would be infringed by disturbance from customers. This should be balanced against the applicants' right to use of their premises under Article 1 of the First Protocol. Interference with these rights is permitted, where this interference is lawful, necessary in a democratic society, and proportionate. Likewise, the residents may argue that their rights under Article 1 of the First Protocol would be infringed. If conditions are imposed, there should be no interference with any convention rights. To the extent that any interference may occur, it would be justifiable in a democratic society, and proportionate.

# 5. **Possible Conditions**

If the application is granted, the Sub-Committee may wish to consider the following condition which has been offered by the premises licence holder:

No regulated entertainment consisting of amplified music shall be provided until an acoustic report has been obtained by the premises licence holder and remedial works have been agreed with, and completed to the satisfaction of the Head of Environment.

### Sir

This report is submitted in support of the review application made by Environmental Health.

The Prince of Wales Public House is a detached building set in what is arguably a rural location. It could be described as a traditional pub that would cater predominately for locals.

Unfortunately the design of this Public House and proximity to other premises has shown that it does not lend itself to provide music as regulated entertainment without causing a nuisance to other residents. Police received noise complaints to these premises with both the existing DPS and his predecessor. On the 28th April 2006 a letter was delivered to the premises outlining our concerns and possible consequences of enforcement or a Premises review should the noise problems persist.

In August 2006 the current DPS Wayne Tiller took over the premises and I conducted a Licensing visit on the 7th September. Amongst other subjects the issue of noise was discussed. It was clarified that the DPS was aware of the previous problems. Following four further complaints to Police from three separate residents a joint Licensing visit was conducted with Winchester City Council and Environmental health on the 19th December 2006.

Upon conducting a site visit it was clear that the function room at the rear of the property was unsuitable for amplified music. I noticed that there were two extractor fans fitted in the right hand side outside wall facing a bungalow approximately 6-8ft away. Upon turning the extractors on they literally made two 18inch openings through this wall. The windows and rear door were also only of single glazed construction.

Following further complaints another joint Licensing visit was arranged with Environmental Health on the 16th April 2007. During this visit the DPS was advised of the condition on the Premises Licence that a noise limiter will be installed and advised of the consequences should this not be complied with. Arrangements were also made at this time for noise monitoring to be conducted by Environmental Health. We are aware that further noise complaints have been made to Environmental Health since this date.

Our recommendation is that there should be no amplified music whatsoever until a full noise assessment has been completed. All the recommendations contained within the report must be complied with to the satisfaction of Environmental health.

The first thing I would like to mention is when planning permission for the dwellings next to the pub was sought there were hundreds of objections on the grounds that it will affect the licence at the pub. Winchester council in their wisdom granted the permission and hence created the problem that we are all having now.

When the extension was built on the back of the pub (where music is now played )although obviously not sound proof enough considering the proximity of the house next door Winchester council again granted planning permission compounding any potential problem.


When someone buys a house next to a pub it is much cheaper than a house in a quieter area the reason for this is because pubs by their very nature can be noisy that's what you expect, I would never buy a house next door to a pub for that very reason and I am quiet sure they you wouldn't either. But to take the price reduction and then complain that there is a noisy pub next door is a bit silly. Having said that I don't blame my neighbour he may well not have noticed that there is a public house just a few meters from his potential new home when he came for a viewing but I do feel that his solicitor should have picked it up when doing his searches and pointed out that there may be a potential noise nuisance. How ever did he miss it.?

If someone buys a house next to a busy road or factory will you put restrictions on the drivers? And that's potently noise all day. If people by a house near a railway line do you stop the trains? Of course not. This pub gives pleasure to hundreds of people and is an occasional nuisance to just a few and they have already enjoyed their discount reflected in the price of the house.

Any way this is all pointless what I really need to tell you is that due to the restrictions already imposed on the licence here it is impossible to earn a living here (I cant even pay my council tax/ business rates) I could if I were aloud to, we were doing alright when we first got here. We have handed our notice in to Admiral taverns and will be leaving here as soon as possible. You may also like to know that when we do leave here we will be leaving separately due to the pressure put on our relationship by you and our neighbour so just because someone buys a house next door to a pub and doesn't want to live next to a pub I have lost my business, my home, my job, my wife and my kids. I know that you have your jobs to do but when you make your decision on what to do with the licence here please remember that there are two sides to every story and I feel ours is just as valid as our neighbours. I feel that we are the victims here as were the licensees here before us also driven out by the neighbours. So do your job but have a heart because if you don't consider the publican too you will find yet another village without a heart.



I have also been told that you are planning to discuss the future of the premises.


I am writing to you to say that I am in favour of the public house continuing in Shirrell Heath.

### Prince of Wales, Shirrell Heath

I refer to my visit to the above premises in company with Mrs Abigail Toms, Environmental Health Officer on Friday 10 August 2007. You are aware that there have been complaints of noise from the premises and this formed the basis of our conversation on that day.

You are aware that the Premises Licence contains certain conditions, particularly concerning public nuisance. You informed me that you do patrol the outside to check on noise levels and that you have the appropriate notices in place. However, it was noted that you did not comply with condition 5 which states that "all external doors and windows must be kept closed except for access and egress, in all rooms when events involving amplified music....taking place." The front door to the premises was open allowing noise to escape, and (iv) under recorded music which states, "the licensee shall install a noise limiter for pre-recorded music to be approved by the Director of Community Services" (now Head of Environment).

Failing to comply with conditions attached to a Premises Licence constitutes an offence of unauthorised licensable activities under Section 136 of the Licensing Act 2003. This offence is committed by any person who "carries on or attempts to carry on a licensable activity on or from any premises otherwise than under and in accordance with an authorisation, or he knowingly allows a licensable activity to be so carried on."

This offence carries a maximum penalty of £20,000 fine and/or six months imprisonment. You would be liable for prosecution under this section. Members of staff, and the licence holder, Osprey Pubs Limited, may also be liable.

You should also be aware that a Responsible Authority or an Interested Party may request the licensing authority to review the premises licence if they consider that the licensing objectives are not being addressed.

I strongly recommend that you comply with all of the conditions attached to the licence when carrying out the licensable activities as failure may result in action as detailed above.

I have copied this letter to Osprey Pubs, Hampshire Constabulary and the Head of Environment.

Prince of Wales, Shirrell Heath Premises Licence PREM 354

At 2200 on Friday 10 August 2007, I attended the above premises in company with Mrs Abigail Toms, Environmental Health Officer, as a result of complaints of noise nuisance.

On our arrival, there was a disco in progress which could clearly be heard outside the premises, and inside a neighbouring property. The front door to the premises was open, and on speaking to the designated premises supervisor, Wayne Tiller, we discovered that there was not a noise limiter installed at the premises.

The premises licence requires that a noise limiter is installed to the satisfaction of the Director of Community services (now Head of Environment) for pre-recorded music, and that all external doors and windows must be kept closed except for access and egress, in all rooms when events involving amplified music....taking place. Clearly, both of these conditions are not being complied with. The licence states that it is the **licence holder's** responsibility to install the noise limiter. Once this is done, if you or Mr Tiller would care to contact the authority, I can arrange for an Environmental Health officer to attend the premises when the limiter is calibrated.

I have attached a letter of warning to Mr Tiller, but I must also inform you that as the licence holder you may also be liable for the offences of carrying on unlicensed activities, or allowing unlicensed activities to take place. I trust that in future you will comply with the conditions of the licence.

You should also be aware that a Responsible Authority or an Interested Party may request the licensing authority to review the premises licence if they consider that the licensing objectives are not being addressed.

I write following my visit to your premises on Friday 13<sup>th</sup> April with PC Gary Miller. The visit was made following a number of complaints alleging noise nuisance from events held at your premises.

You advised me that the majority of functions are held by people hiring the rear room for celebrations although you do occasionally hold your own functions.

I am keen to carry out noise monitoring to ascertain whether or not the noise from functions is causing a statutory nuisance to neighbours. I understand that you do not have any events booked at present but would be grateful if you could let me know of any future events as soon as possible.

I note that your licensing conditions require you to install a noise limiter for pre-recorded music. Whilst I am not convinced that this will totally resolve any potential noise problems, given the construction of the room, it will help to ensure that noise levels are controlled particularly given that customers bring their own music equipment to the premises.

I have asked John Myall, Licensing Manager to respond to you directly to clarify the licensing condition that states 'No activity shall take place in the garden after 2130.'

I look forward to hearing from you in due course. Thank you for your assistance and cooperation.

I refer to a letter to you from Mrs Abigail Toms, Environmental Health Officer for the Council, dated 16 April 2007.

I understand that you required clarification of a condition contained in the Premises Licence.

At a meeting of the Licensing Sub Committee on 21 September 2005, certain conditions were added as a result of concerns raised by Interested Parties relating to noise nuisance. As a result, Public Nuisance condition 6 states, "No activity shall take place in the garden after 2130." This was imposed to prevent noise from outside the premises after that time. The condition means that the garden cannot be used after 2100 for any purpose.

If you wish your customers to use the garden after that time, for instance when the smoking ban starts in July, Osprey Pubs would have to apply to vary the licence to have that condition varied or removed.

There are conditions attached to the licence restricting musical events to 12 occasions per year and requiring that the Police and the Licensing Authority are notified not less than 10 working days before any event. If the Police then object, the Licensing Authority would have the power to veto the event. I am given to understand that events have taken place involving the playing of recorded music. I am rather concerned about this as I am not aware of any such notifications to either the Police or this department.

Mrs Toms also mentions the condition relating to a noise limiter. There is no record that a noise limiter has been installed, or if one has been approved by the Director of Communities.

Failure to comply with any of the conditions contained within the licence constitutes an offence of providing unlicensed activities, which carries a penalty of £20,000 fine and/or six months imprisonment. This offence is committed by any person who provides the activities, whether the licence holder, DPS or member of staff.

I trust that this clarifies the situation and that you will comply with the conditions. If you have any queries, please do not hesitate to contact this office.

Further to my telephone call to your office & your message on our answer-phone yesterday, Monday 10<sup>th</sup> September, I write to confirm that we shall be attending the above Review meeting for The Prince of Wales.

We are considering purchasing the new Admiral Taverns ten year lease on The Prince of Wales, and obviously have an interest in the Committee's decision at the Review meeting. We would like to reassure the Committee that we have no intention of continuing the current tenant's policy of playing loud music. In fact we intend to return The Prince of Wales to a sedate country inn type establishment serving good home cooked food and will positively not be encouraging noise & disturbance of any kind.

Should we purchase the lease, it will be our intention to work very much with the local community. We intend to approach the neighbours either in person or by letter requesting their thoughts on the pub and what services they would like the pub to offer. We intend to develop the existing recycling facility, offer an internet lounge café facility and possibly develop a Bed & Breakfast offering.

We understand the current Licence conditions prevent use of the pub garden after 9.30pm. As this restricts the use of what is very much an asset to the pub & it's customers, we would be seeking to revoke this condition before next summer. Whilst we respect & understand the Licensing Committees decision to place restrictions on the current tenant, we feel that we would not be able to continue with our plans to purchase the lease if the business is restricted in what is already a very competitive marketplace.



### Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

- No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises Licence (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.

# Annex 3 – Conditions attached after a hearing by the licensing authority

### **Crime and Disorder**

- 1. All external walkways and car parking areas shall be illuminated during the hours of darkness up to 30 minutes after the premises close.
- 2. All staff shall maintain a close watch on the trading area and behaviour of customers at all times and shall either a) take appropriate action where needed or b) report concerns to their manager (where they are not authorised to deal personally with an issue.

# **Public Nuisance**

- 1. Whilst music is being played as part of regulated entertainment, one of the licensees shall check periodically that noise levels are acceptable. Such monitoring shall be carried out at the boundary of the premises to ensure that local residents are not likely to be disturbed.
- 2. Prominent, clear notices shall be displayed at all exits requesting customers to respect the needs of local residents, to leave the premises and the area quietly and the Licensee shall exercise personal responsibility to ensure that this is carried out.
- 3. Staff shall be given appropriate instructions and training to encourage customers to leave the premises quietly and not to loiter in the vicinity of the premises so as to minimise disturbance to local residents and the Licensee shall take a positive role in this process.
- 4. Regulated entertainment shall be restricted to the inside of the premises.

- 5. All external doors and windows must be kept closed other than for access and egress, in all rooms when events involving amplified music or speech are taking place.
- 6. No activity shall take place in the garden after 2130.

# **Protection of Children**

1. The premises shall adopt and implement the Hampshire Constabulary's Challenge 21 Scheme.
