EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

To consider the confirmation of Tree Preservation Order 2072, to which three objections have been raised.

RECOMMENDATION:

That, having taken into consideration the representations received, Tree Preservation Order 2072 be confirmed.

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DETAIL:

- 1. TPO 2072 TIOMAN, STRATTON ROAD, WINCHESTER
- 1.1 A notification of proposed work to trees in a conservation area had been received for the felling of this tree.
- 1.2 The tree officer attended the site to assess the tree and determined:
 - The spruce can be seen from Stratton Road and the surrounding area.
 - This tree makes a significant contribution to the visual amenity of the area.
- 1.3 Thus, the criteria for a Tree Preservation Order was met and a TPO was made on 26 November 2012.

The grounds for making the order were as follows: "A notification of proposed work to trees in a conservation area has been received for the felling of this tree. The Spruce can be seen from Stratton Road and the surrounding area. This tree makes a significant contribution to the visual amenity of the area and it is considered expedient to serve a TPO."

Formal Objection

- 1.4 Three objections to the TPO have been received; one from the land owner and two from neighbouring land owners.
- 1.5 The objections stated:
 - The tree in question was most likely purchased as a Christmas tree.
 - It has grown rapidly and now stands at approximately 18m high.
 - Spruces are shallow rooted, subject to wind throw and do not root well in chalk.
 - It is located 9m from the nearest house wall on a bank 1.5m above the ground floor level of the property.
 - Due to the prevailing wind it is likely that wind throw would cause the tree to fall on the bedroom wall (reference made to incident in Teg Down, Winchester).
 - Norway Spruce is not a native species and no garden designer would consider planting an individual tree in a small garden.
 - The tree dominates the garden and prevents growth of plants. Needles and pine cones are a continual nuisance.

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• It is only visible when travelling west along Stratton Road which is unadopted.

- If allowed to remove the tree, the owner would plant a native species.
- The tree has a detrimental effect upon the neighbouring property by restricting light, particularly in the winter months.
- Spruces are usually planted in groups and being exposed, the potential
 of this tree to fall and cause injury/damage in a residential area is
 substantial.
- Neighbours consider the tree to be 'unsightly' as viewed from their property.

Officer Comments

- 1.6 In response to the public representation, the Tree Officer has observed that:
 - Spruces are relatively shallow rooted compared to other species but it
 is unusual to find roots below a depth of 500mm on any tree. At the
 time of inspection this particular tree was in reasonable overall health
 with no structural defects or ground movement to indicate that failure
 was likely.
 - Should the order be confirmed the owner or neighbour could still apply for consent to prune the tree to improve light conditions in the neighbouring property. The Council's Tree Officer would be more than happy to meet onsite to discuss possible works.
 - Without a TPO, the Council would not be able to enforce a requirement for replacement planting following the removal of the tree.
- 1.7 Notwithstanding the objections, in light of the assessment of the Tree Officer it is recommended that the Tree Preservation Order 2072 is confirmed.

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
