HCC has indicated that Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding will be sought to support the implementation of these changes, yet in the latest CIL application to Winchester City Council (WCC) this has not been forthcoming. Can the Cabinet Member for Climate and Nature Emergency confirm that WCC would be able to use CIL to support HCC speed reduction schemes?

This year, residents have again witnessed prolonged sewage discharges, commonly known as storm overflows, into the River Itchen, the River Meon, the River Hamble and their tributaries. The most notable examples have been from outfalls in Wickham and Durley, together with the prolonged discharge from Harestock Wastewater Treatment Works.

Given the limited capacity of the Environment Agency and community groups to undertake widespread, real-time water quality monitoring during storm overflow events, would the Council consider piloting the enhancement of its existing water level monitoring network to also measure water quality at a small number of strategically selected locations, exploring external funding opportunities and partnerships where appropriate?

- Whether it delivers demonstrable district-wide benefit,
- Whether it represents a proportionate and best-value use of public funds,
- If it has been appropriately assessed under the Subsidy Control regime, and
- If it has been developed through a fair and transparent process consistent with the treatment that would be expected where significant public funding supports a commercial activity.

All of the above needs to be transparent and for this matter to be considered by Full Council despite the Cabinet Decision how can we as Elected Councillors for whatever Party we are aligned with make a voting decision on a large amount of CIL Monies?
