A7	Procurement of Waste & Recycling Collection Vehicles	 That it be agreed to procure, through Biffa, nine 12 tonne food waste vehicles, to operate on Hydro-treated Vegetable Oil, at an estimated cost of up to £1.34m to be funded by the New Burdens capital grant. That it be agreed to provide through the contract with Biffa an electric refuse collection vehicle for the new route to be introduced in Autumn 2024. That the annual revenue cost of £36k to cover the cost of the electric Refuse Collection Vehicle be agreed, to be funded 	The council is on a journey to increase recycling rates in the district, and this report brings forward the next stage. Specifically, the introduction of kerbside food waste recycling and the need to procure vehicles to enable this by the 31 st March 2026. This will build upon the council recent success of increasing recycling rates since 2019, including the introduction of kerbside glass collections, improved garden waste service, and the weekly kerbside collection of batteries and small electrical items. Cabinet agreed in report CAB3439 that it would seek to introduce a separate food	The Council could procure the vehicles independently of Biffa. This option was previously rejected in CAB3439 because the council does not have the necessary buying power, knowledge nor understanding of the market. To purchase the vehicles, the Council would require advice on specification, identification of frameworks and would incur procurement costs. This could cause a significant delay to purchasing the necessary vehicles and put the Council at risk of missing the government implementation deadline. The Council has considered Biffa purchasing and owning the food waste vehicles and passing the capital cost to the
