I would like to make formal representations regarding the licensing application by Coffee Lab Academy for the premises known as Coffee Lab Academy at 18A Little Minster Street, Winchester, Hampshire SO23 9HB.

Firstly, I would like to inform you that my husband (disabled 92 year old with poor health and is room-ridden at the front of the flat) and I am his carer (85 year old and registered disabled too), we both live directly above The Coffee Lab Academy at no2 Mozzetta, Kings Head Yard, Winchester. This application has come at a very stressful time for our family.

I would like to object to this application for a number of reasons which are detailed below:

The prevention of crime and disorder

We believe if this application went ahead, it would increase crime and disorder to this area, with late night drinking and a general demise of the area that will attract criminals and increase anti-social behaviour. In this small road and alleyway which is currently used regularly by drug addicts and drunken people for urinating, drug use, theft and general anti-social behaviour. This alley way is regularly seen with empty cans, alcoholic drinks, abandoned drug syringes all caused by the previous night-time economy and also is inhabited by drug addicts and alcoholics living in the city centre. With the introduction of late night drinking this problem will only significantly increase, so in order to prevent crime and disorder we strongly believe this licensing application should not be approved.

It has been proven that late night drinking increases anti-social behaviour and this application if successful will a detriment to the thriving city of Winchester.

Public safety

We believe if this application went ahead, it would increase crime and disorder to this area, with late night drinking and a general demise of the area that will attract criminals and increase anti-social behaviour. In this small road and alleyway which is currently used regularly by drug addicts and drunken people for urinating, drug use, theft and general anti-social behaviour. We believe if this application was

successful, it would impact public safety by allowing night-time and all day alcoholic consumption at Coffee Lab. Drinkers would be on the streets directly below our flat all day and late at night causing potential unsafe situations for the general public and also my husband and I. I often have to leave the flat to run emergency errands nearby for my ill husband and would feel very in danger if all day drinkers were right on my doorstep causing an unsafe situation for me and my immediate family.

The prevention of public nuisance

We believe if this application went ahead, it would increase public nuisance to this area with large groups of people gathering on the streets/pavements along with lots of traffic in the area too. Alcoholic consumption would increase public nuisance and will hugely be detrimental to our health. We are both OAPS suffering with poor health and this would have a negative impact on our whole life. We are very worried about the public nuisance this will cause to this lovely area.

Since Coffee Lab increased their premises the noise and disruption has increased significantly and that is just coffee drinkers without serving any alcoholic drinks, late at night. We feel very strongly that this will bring a significant increase to public nuisance and we will do everything to protect our area and the impact to our life.

Summary:

We would like the licensing committee to note that my husband is in poor health and is bed-ridden in the front of the flat which overlooks Coffee Lab, this will have a significant impact to the end of his life and also mine. I currently care for my disabled husband and am very stressed out with the anxiety that, that brings and also by having this licensing application happen.

I am currently on medication for poor mental health and Anxiety and this licensing application has brought a lot of unnecessary anxiety to myself and my family.

Thank you for inviting my reaction to your proposal.

I have lived at no. 11 King's Head Yard (SO23 9HB), a few feet away from no. 18A Little Minster St (also SO23 9HB), for some 30 years. This application revives bitter memories of Minstrels which used to stand precisely where the Mozetta building is, on the ground floor of which is the Coffee Lab Academy.

This small residential area already has to cope with noisy late-night revellers making their way home after a night on the town. Live and recorded music, together with the supply of alcohol, throughout the day until late at night on the ground floor of the Mozetta building fills me with dread. No amount of sound insulation will prevent the additional public nuisance: doors have to be opened to allow access to and from the venue, and they will be opened regularly. Crowds either arriving or departing will foregather in King's Head Yard and at the top end of Little Minster Street directly underneath my windows, one of which is my bedroom, the only bedroom in the house. It is inevitable that I will be directly affected by the noise on a daily and nightly basis.

There are a number of us living in this immediate vicinity and we do demand the right to be able to live here and sleep at night without disturbance. You may or may not be aware of correspondence with other Council departments with responsibilities for rubbish disposal, and early morning deliveries in this small area. We simply cannot accept yet another threat to our day-time, nocturnal and early-morning peace.

I write therefore to object to this application in the strongest possible terms. Please do not allow this application to go ahead. Please make the prevention of public nuisance a number one concern.

I have owned 5 Kings Head Yard, SO23 9HB, which is opposite the Mozzetta Building, since 2001. I have no experience of the disturbance caused by Minstrels, which was closed by the time of my arrival.

Minstrels was situated exactly where the Mozzetta now stands. Neighbours tell me that it completely destroyed the tranquillity of this quiet little square which is primarily a residential area. The return of music venue on this site is not something I welcome.

As all the bedroom, lounge and kitchen windows of 5 and 7 open directly on to the Kings Head Yard, it will be impossible to maintain adequate ventilation without considerable intrusion from music, crowds, car doors slamming and taxis etc.

We are writing to lodge a formal objection to the License Application made by Coffee Lab Academy Ltd for live and recorded music, the supply of alcohol on and off the premises and extended opening hours at 18 Little Minster Street, SO23 9HB

This is a high density residential area & the noise nuisance will impact a large number of residents in close proximity

The premises in question comprises the ground floor of a multi-occupancy block of flats (Mozzeta). This proposed licence will cause huge noise nuisance and disturbance to residents of the flats and also to neighbours in Kings Head yard, St Clement Street, St Thomas Street and Little Minster Street.

There is no precedent for an alcohol and or music performance licence at this premises and indeed a past application by Carluccios was turned down because of the potential to cause significant noise nuisance to local residents.

Coffee Lab currently operates as a Cafe - serving beverages, light snacks to take away and consume on the premises 7 days a week from 8am until 4pm i.e. 8 hours a day, 56 hours a week.

The proposed licence would be a huge departure from the current operation allowing the service of alcohol from 9am in the morning - WHY? - and open from 8am until 11pm i.e. 15 hours a day, 105 hours a week. These hours are simply not compatible with a residential area and show no regard for the right of local residents to enjoy a peaceful existence.

To compound matters, the applicant (Coffee Lab) has concurrently applied for a similar licence at a separate premises in The Square approx 50 yards from 18A Little minster Street. We don't need to point out that there are already a large number of well established licensed premises in The Square which struggle to cope with the influx of customers they attract who spill out on to the streets and into the Cathedral grounds. There simply isn't the physical capacity to add two more licensed premises in the area.

It cannot be overemphasised how sound carries and reverberates along paved and terraced streets such as Little Minster Street and the neighbouring roads. Live music is amplified and is always loud, not least to fill a venue but also to compete with noisy, boisterous customers. This application would permit recorded music from 8am to 11pm (105 hours per week) and live music from 6pm to 11pm (35 hours per week) and would, without doubt result in significant noise nuisance to the wider neighbourhood at unsociable hours.

Anti-social behaviour is problematic in Winchester's late night economy

Local residents are very familiar with the type of anti-social behaviour that accompanies the late night economy especially in venues that serve only alcohol and not food. Yet another licensed establishment such as this on a residential street will be adding to a problem that

already exists. **Here are some examples of the type of anti-social behaviour that residents endure and for which they have to pick up the pieces and foot the bill:**

- Drunken, loud, raucous and intimidating groups parading the streets, especially after closing time and in to the early hours of the morning with no regard for the disturbance the noise they make has on residents
- Fighting and brawling in the streets
- Broken bottles and beer glasses in the streets
- Banging on front doors and ringing door bells
- Petty vandalism e.g. breaking windows, damaging street furniture, upturned rubbish bins and rubbish bags
- Urinating, defecating and vomiting in public places, against houses, on cars, street furniture
- Profane graffiti daubed on houses and walls
- Vandalism of cars parked in residents parking bays - broken wing mirrors, bent wiper blades, scratched paintwork, dented bodywork resulting from people jumping on vehicles

Narrow ancient streets and no visitor parking

The streets local to Little Minster Street are narrow ancient streets accessed via a one-way system and are not suitable for modern day traffic.

There is no provision for on-street visitor parking.

Customers of restaurants and bars park (illegally) in residents parking bays in the evening, on pavements and double yellow lines. This is a huge inconvenience to residents who as a consequence have to walk in the road to pass cars and who are unable to park despite having paid to use residents parking bays.

Additional licensed premises will increase traffic volume, noise and nuisance contrary to the environmental objectives of the City, at all hours of the day and particularly at and after closing time.

These are all very strong reasons to reject the licence application on the grounds of prevention of public nuisance, local crime and vandalism.

Good morning

We were made aware of the aforementioned application and we would like to object it. Mr Ron Wilson who has a property adjacent to 8 Little Minster Street on Kings Head Yard will also be writing to you as our properties face Coffee Lab's building. Our reasons being:

We provide accommodation to guests at 8 Little Minster Street, above Carol Darby's hat shop and directly opposite the building. The noise of music late at night will disturb our guests.

Also, patrons leaving late at night would cause disturbance when they walk up Kings Head Yard and through Little Minster Street. It is a mixed residential and commercial area but primarily a residential one.

We work hard at The Old Vine to keep noise nuisance under control both to our guests and local residents reason why we do not provide live music often and our closing times are way earlier than permitted in our license.

There are enough alcohol licenses in the vicinity and I must remember that the effect of another licensed premises is quite difficult to predict with operators causing a lot of trouble before (Bar 3One, Slug & Lettuce) and I cannot imagine how much disruption this could cause to the elderly residents of La Mozzetta(there are a few).

Dear Sir/Madam,

Re. Coffee Lab, 18a Little Minster Street - Application for Alcohol and Music Licences

We **object** strongly to the proposal for alcohol and music licences at this location in an overwhelmingly residential area. The proposed bar is, literally, *encased* by homes at close proximity (people live nearby on all sides ... as well as above). We live some handful of doors away, and would undoubtedly hear music and voices, and suffer attendant issues.

The proposed activities are absolutely unacceptable in this location ... which is, presumably, why the city council's own environmental health department has objected, on two previous occasions, to any similar (albeit lesser) activity:

- In 2002/3 when councillors passed the original plans for 18a Little Minster Street, it was *on condition* that there was no wine bar beneath. 'Environmental Health - recommended refusal of the original scheme which incorporated a wine bar on the ground floor due to possible impact on the future residents. The revised scheme for a shop on the ground floor raises no concerns. No objection subject to conditions.' (Proudlock, June 2002)

- In 2008, Environmental Health raised a second objection, this time to use as a restaurant. 'I am concerned that this application site is located in very close proximity to a number of residential properties and that there is great potential for olfactory and or noise disturbance.' (Mrs Abigail Toms, Environmental Protection, memo to Director of Operations, 7 January 2008). The application was withdrawn.

On the specific licensing objections ...

1. **The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.** Although crime cannot be predicted, it is highly possible that disorder might result as customers – who have enjoyed the intoxicating combination of alcohol and live music – decant from a hot and energetic venue into the quiet and restricted areas of King's Head Yard and surrounding lanes.

2. **Public Safety.** This same movement of people, especially at 'closing time' could result in risk to public safety ... including over-crowding and the mingling with traffic through the narrow lanes that surround the proposed venue.

3. **The Prevention of Public Nuisance.** A bar with live music operating late into the night would, without question, create a significant nuisance of noise, smells, anti-social behaviour and hindrance of thoroughfares, with a seriously detrimental effect on the quality of life of people who live in extremely close proximity and nearby.

4. **The Protection of Children from Harm.** Many closely adjacent households, including at least one in King's Head Yard – but also, from observation, in the building above the proposed venue - have young children, whose sleep, well-being and safety could be seriously compromised by noise in the evening, as well as proximity to people who are intoxicated and/or their potential unsafe actions.

In conclusion, we agree with previous opinions of the city council Environmental Health officers, that the use of the Coffee Lab space even for a restaurant or wine bar would be extremely detrimental to nearby residents ... however we believe this current proposal is several factors greater in potential nuisance.

A bar with alcohol and music licences late into the night is completely unacceptable in this densely populated, mainly residential area, with its tight lanes and limited space.

We would expect the wellbeing of householders and families to come first.

We **object** to this proposal for alcohol and music licences in a quiet and predominantly residential area, for the following reasons:

1. **The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.** The narrow streets and alleys (some poorly lit) around the applicant's premises could easily encourage alcohol fuelled crime and disorder. Among other things, parked cars in Kings Head Yard and St Thomas Street could become targets of vandalism by inebriated customers, particularly in the evening.
2. **Public Safety.** The nature of the tortuous traffic flow around Kings Head Yard, when combined with the movement of people especially at closing time (some possibly in an inebriated state), could foreseeably result in a risk to public safety.

'Environmental Health - recommended refusal of the original scheme which incorporated a wine bar on the ground floor due to possible impact on the future residents. The revised scheme for a shop on the ground floor raises no concerns. No objection subject to conditions.' (Proudlock, June 2002)
- In 2008, Environmental Health raised a second objection, this time to use as a restaurant. 'I am concerned that this application site is located in very close proximity to a number of residential properties and that there is great potential for olfactory and or noise disturbance.' (Mrs Abigail Toms, Environmental Protection, memo to Director of Operations, 7 January 2008). The application was withdrawn.

On the specific licensing objections ...

1. The Prevention of Crime and Disorder. Although crime cannot be predicted, it is highly possible that disorder might result as customers – who have enjoyed the intoxicating combination of alcohol and live music – decant from a hot and energetic venue into the quiet and restricted areas of King's Head Yard and surrounding lanes.

2. Public Safety. This same movement of people, especially at 'closing time' could result in risk to public safety ... including over-crowding and the mingling with traffic through the narrow lanes that surround the proposed venue.

3. The Prevention of Public Nuisance. A bar with live music operating late into the night would, without question, create a significant nuisance of noise, smells, anti-social behaviour and hindrance of thoroughfares, with a seriously detrimental effect on the quality of life of people who live in extremely close proximity and nearby.

4. The Protection of Children from Harm. Many closely adjacent households, including at least one in King's Head Yard – but also, from observation, in the building above the proposed venue - have young children, whose sleep, well-being and safety could be seriously compromised by noise in the evening, as well as proximity to people who are intoxicated and/or their potential unsafe actions.

In conclusion, we agree with previous opinions of the city council Environmental Health officers, that the use of the Coffee Lab space even for a restaurant or wine bar would be extremely detrimental to nearby residents ... however we believe this current proposal is several factors greater in potential nuisance.

A bar with alcohol and music licences late into the night is completely unacceptable in this densely populated, mainly residential area, with its tight lanes and limited space.

We would expect the wellbeing of householders and families to come first.

With regard to Licensing Application at 18A Little Minster Street, Winchester. SO23 9HB.

Firstly this is a significant area of Private dwellings and within the immediate area there are many licensed properties, however these are predominantly accessed from the area of The Square. The Square is easily policed. To create another alcohol serving establishment to the much more private and domestic area facing both Little Minster Street and Kings Head Yard is less easily policed, it is a backwater. Residents will be upset by noise from the music license and late night revelry, and that alone is a concern for antagonism and likely confrontation. When we talk about public safety that includes all those living in the area , drink often fuels unsocial and antagonistic behaviour and that more alcohol and music establishments I believe should not be considered for this quiet area, both for the comfort and more importantly the safety of the residents.

The above also creates ideal conditions for crime and public disorder in what is currently a quiet and peaceful backwater with low impact properties and premises.

The roads are narrow and in the evenings are often used for parking by local residents, the roads are narrow and not well lit and over indulged clients will often just walk straight into moving vehicles. Public safety is not great in these conditions.

When it comes to protecting children from harm, this is a quiet backwater where under age drinkers will be difficult to manage, unlike in The Square where everything is seen, where cars pass regularly knowing that people are drinking and they drive accordingly.

As I say in and around Little Minster Street, Kings Head Yard and St Thomas Street there are many cars parked belonging to residents. Crime against vehicles (keying etc) are more common in areas where drinking takes place, and to allow alcohol in the Coffee Lab in this quiet area could lead to this sort of unnecessary vandalism.

Already we the residents have to put up with staff of all the cafes and restaurants standing outside our properties, smoking and depositing cigarette ends on the road and footpaths, which I will add is a public health issue which the city council seems to turn a blind eye to. Mozzetta is primarily a residential block comprising 6 flats situated above a retail unit. We believe that three of the flats are owned and occupied by people that are retired (of which three occupants are in their 80's and in various states of ill-health). The other three flats are occupied by tenants who also live their lives very quietly.

The area surrounding Mozzetta is residential, and is generally a very quiet and safe place to live. It is so quiet that occupants on the balcony of the top floor can hear the conversations of pedestrians walking below, noise seems to travel vertically rather than horizontally in both Little Minster street and Kings Head Yard.

We are very concerned about the proposed licensing application from Coffee Lab.

Noise

Past experience ref the nearby Slug and Lettuce, suggests that publicans are unable to enforce noise control on their clientele both within and whilst leaving their premises. We are concerned that we have no data of how noise may travel within the Mozzetta building, and what control measures need to be put into place to mitigate its effect on the residents above. Some residents sleep after lunch, and go to bed quite early – this may well not be possible if the noise from Coffee Lab is too loud. Again from experience it is often the lower notes on the music register that seem to resonate within the building. We are not certain if any babies or small children of tenants are currently resident in Mozzetta, but excessive noise would be deleterious to their health, and the flats would no longer be suitable in the future, for families; which would reduce both the value and income for flat owners. Noise is envisaged to be a particular problem at closing times.

Odour

We are concerned that some of clientele of Coffee Lab will be standing outside smoking, causing both a litter problem, but more importantly introducing smoke into the flats above. The only ventilation to the main living room and the master bedroom of three of the flats are the windows situated directly above the Coffee Lab frontage. Clientelle may also stand around the corner in Kings Head Yard, affecting the other three flats.

The retail unit was designed as a retail unit, so that it would not impact on the quality of life of the residents that live above the unit. On that basis, it was envisaged that the unit would be open during normal retail hours 8am to 5pm. This unit has presumably (as we cannot remember being consulted) already changed its planning status from Class A1 to A3, and now it effectively wants to become a public house (Class A4).

We therefore object to any licensable activities regarding music and supply of alcohol; and any activities outside normal retail hours.

I am writing on behalf of Winchester Cathedral to object to the application by Coffee Lab to sell alcohol for off-site consumption from both of its locations in Winchester town centre.

Licensing objective regarding **'the prevention of public nuisance'**:

The area around The Market already has a high concentration of food and alcohol-related businesses. The private grounds of the cathedral, particularly the Outer Close, are the nearest green open space to the Market businesses and have been acting effectively as a public park where food and drink is consumed by large numbers of people, resulting in a copious amount of litter, debris and urination which is unwanted, unsightly and a nuisance to visitors and staff. In addition, groups of drinkers regularly gather on the Western boundary near Little Minster Street, and this is an ongoing nuisance and an issue which we are forced to deal with by regularly calling on the BID Rangers, the police and our own security patrols. The addition of another outlet selling alcohol for off-site consumption will only worsen the situation.

We believe this situation will only be exacerbated by approving the application by Coffee Lab to sell alcohol for off-site consumption and could also prove to be a danger to the public in the event that alcohol is sold in glass bottles.

Licensing objective regarding **'the prevention of crime and disorder'**

We are confronted on a regular basis by issues of street drinking and its associated crime and disorder in and around the cathedral grounds and we are concerned that this will increase if Coffee Lab is granted a licence to sell alcohol for off-site consumption. The Little Minster area of the Outer Close suffers from groups of adult drinkers, drug-users and rough sleepers congregating along the western wall and using the visitor centre toilets. The easy access to another business selling alcohol for offsite consumption can only make the situation worse.

We fully understand that, like all other hospitality businesses, including the cathedral, Coffee Lab has suffered greatly as a result of the pandemic and we don't want to damage their business unnecessarily. Whilst we're not keen on more alcohol sales in the immediate area, we don't feel we can object to its sale indoors where we hope management would act responsibly in discouraging excessive consumption by their customers

I urge you to consider placing strong restrictions on this application as set out above, if it is to receive approval.

I wish to register an objection to the proposed application for licenced activities at 18A Little Minster Street including live music, recorded music and the supply of alcohol, all with extended opening hours.

I have lived at 3 Calpe Yards since 1995. I live there with my wife and two young children. Our home straddles Little Minster Street and St Thomas Street.

In the evening, this is a quiet residential area. There have been occasions when neighbours and neighbouring businesses have had parties with many guests and loud music, when the disturbance has been substantial, but these are singular events.

What is proposed are apparently daily events with potential to cause substantial disturbance over an extended period of time.

There are many businesses of the sort proposed facing onto the Square and Great Minster Street. Although some have exits on to Little Minster Street, in practice, there is hardly any movement from these and the natural focus of the customers of these businesses is towards the Square.

What is being proposed for 18A Little Minster Street will open up Little Minster St to noise and disturbance which is extremely inappropriate for this quiet area.

I understand that the original planning permission in 2002 for 18A Little Minster St was subject to a condition that there was to be no wine bar there but permission was granted for a shop. The concern at that time was as to the impact upon the local residential area. There was a second application in 2008 for a restaurant combined with a food shop. Again Environmental Health raised objections because of the potential for olfactory and auditory disturbance. The application was withdrawn.

With respect, these prior objections remain equally valid today and I urge the Committee to view this application in the same light.

Considering the four licencing objections:

1. Crime and disorder -- I note that the police have suggested stringent controls for this application if is granted. However it should be borne in mind that the staff at the premises will usually only be aware of a crime once it has been committed and therefore I cannot envisage any condition which would prevent criminal activity and disorder.
2. Public safety --This is bound to be worsened by the increase in the number of people on the street using these premises. The neighbouring passageways are narrow and it can be daunting to pass along one at the same time as a drunken and noisy individual.
3. Public nuisance -- In this context, the performance of live and recorded music will be of considerable disturbance if it is capable of being heard outside the premises.
4. Protection of children -- The nature of this proposal is essentially entertainment for adults. Children should learn to be aware of the follies of adults but this proposal might provide an example (for the reasons above) which is rather too obvious.

The activities proposed should be confined to particular areas of Winchester and the Square is most appropriate.

A bar with alcohol and music licences operating late into the night at 18A Little Minster Street is really not at all suitable for a densely populated mainly residential area with narrow lanes and limited space.

I urge the Committee to reject these applications.

I am writing to oppose the application by Coffee Lab, 18a Little Minster Street below the apartments known as Mozzetta for the sale of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises, and and to play live and recorded music 7 days a week 18:00 - 23:00 and New Years Eve 08:00 - 02:00.

Historically a condition of the planning permission stipulated commercial use on the ground floor. The original landlord of Mozzetta proposed retail when marketing the apartments but following the sale of the last apartment applied for restaurant use to provide a higher return on investment. This was opposed by the six apartment owners and with the assistance of planning consultants and legal experts [at significant expense] we successfully blocked change of use. Initially the retail unit was a high quality furniture store owned by The Hambledon and totally in keeping with the aesthetic of the building design. This was replaced with another furniture store and when this closed the space was subsequently divided into two retail units. Coffee Lab moved into one [coffee shops do not require restaurant planning but can only serve food made off the premises hence no cooking]. The other unit was occupied until recently by an independant health food shop until Coffee Lab were granted a new lease on both units which have been returned to one large unit and occupied by Coffee Lab.

As residents we have worked hard over the years to protect our investments, successfully opposing restaurant use and more recently outside seating for customers of Coffee Lab. We feel that this latest application is totally unsuitable for a retail unit under high quality apartments in a quiet predominantly residential area of the city. At no point have Coffee Lab consulted the apartment owners over this or indeed any application.

My objection is on the following grounds:

1. The premises are directly under apartments which will suffer from noise disturbance.
2. First floor apartments have top hinged windows for ventilation on the front elevation immediately above the entrance to Coffee Lab which allow any noise from below to be heard inside.
3. Second and Third floor apartments have open balconies on the front elevation immediatly above the entrance to Coffee Lab which will suffer from any noise from below.

4. As smoking will not be possible inside the premises anyone outside smoking will pollute the apartments with smoke.
5. Customers entering and exiting will be heard, as will the music, when doors are opened for access.
6. Both access streets from Southgate Street direction for pedestrian customers pass directly next to the building which has roof gardens to the usually quiet rear elevation.
7. The area is predominantly residential with the exception of the rear of licenced premises in The Square opposite Mozzetta these are not entrance/exits to these premises.
8. Customers leaving the premises will disturb residents in the neighbouring properties.

Both my apartment and the other on the first floor are occupied by elderly residents in their 90's who appreciate living in a quiet backwater yet near to shops in the High Street. The other apartments are a mix of residents who enjoy the balconies at the front of the building which is their only outdoor space.

In summary I just do not think that these premises are suitable for a licenced premises with music.
