- Reseeded in 2017
- Now a thriving restoration project

Barton Meadows and Bats

- 12 of 18 species recorded in 2019
- Locally important habitat
- Rich food source
- Corridor between habitat
- Roosting opportunities

- New areas of potential grazing



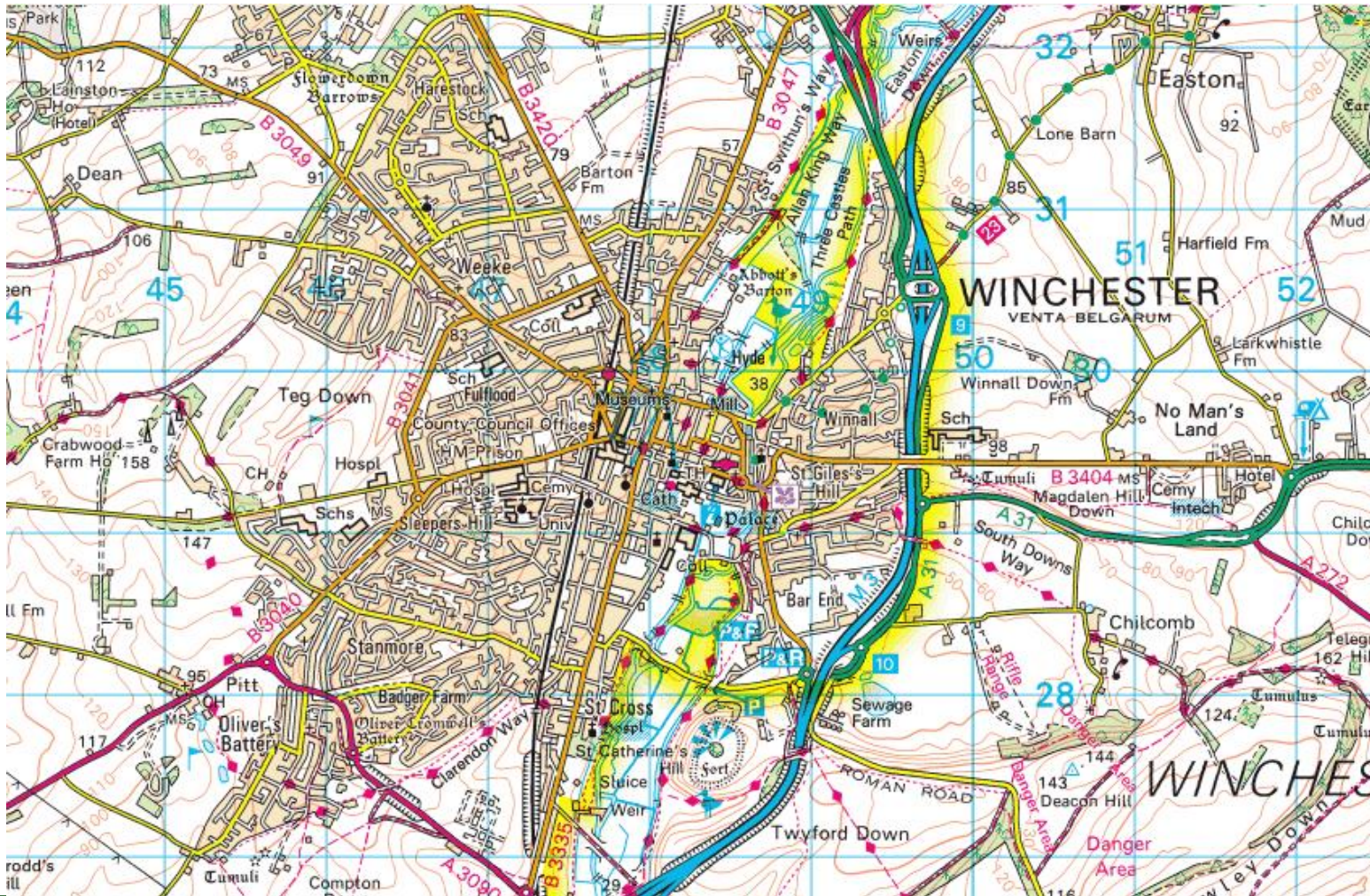
Public access
