Executive Summary

This report is the cumulation of 12 months of engagement carried out by Jigsaw (Partnerships and Places) in partnership with Winchester City Council as a launchpad for the next stage of the Central Winchester Regeneration (CWR) project. It was important to use the time we had constructively to listen to the concerns and ideas of local people, interest groups and stakeholders and at the same time immerse the team and bring the partnership with the city to life.

We were acutely aware of the engagement work carried out in the production of the Supplementary Planning Guidance for CWR, and see this documents as the cornerstone of the project. However given it was produced in 2018, pre COVID-19, and in many respect focused on the town scape attributes that any successful scheme would need to meet we wanted to test its robustness but more critically build upon it to reflect some of the other challenges presented by the climate emergency and the need to empower local people in the process of (re)making this part of Winchester and sharing the benefits that it will bring.

The report provides an overview of the Stakeholder Mapping and Programme to date and into 2025. It then highlights the outputs from the Active (personal interaction), Passive (online) and Meanwhile activities. In particular it shows how the output from the active engagement is amplified through the passive (online) processes to test whether what we have discovered together in smaller groups resonates with the population at large. We then do a deep-dive into the Co-Creation sessions and show how the outputs link back to the SPD.

Finally, we show how all this work will be used going forward to inform the project brief, including the design brief for the project and how the emerging design work will be used for further engagement prior to any planning application being made.



Active Engagement



[↑] District Engagement Location









Stakeholder Workshops Outputs

We engaged with the local community and stakeholders to facilitate the identification of key issues, desired outcomes, and actionable steps for the project in each of the focus areas.


Commonplace Survey

The Commonplace Survey took the themes that emerged from the Stakeholder Workshops and asked the wider public, via the online platform, to what degree they agreed with the themes or not.

Footprint Co-Creation: People Planet Place

Footprint is a methodology used by Jigsaw to bring multifaceted viewpoints together using Co-Creation. This is different to the previous two processes which create clear boundaries. Here we are looking to form a holistic idea about what CWR could be based on People, Place and Planet.

The outputs from the previous process are then used to verify the outcomes and ensure the specific concerns of particular groups or individuals have not been overlooked.






Introduction



Illustrated Conversation



Participants mentioned places like Waterford, with its mix of heritage buildings and art installations, and Bristol, known for its annual street art festival, as exemplar cities that CWR should look toward. They discussed creating vibrant, multifunctional public spaces, drawing inspiration from various successful projects across the UK, to create a place that has it's own recognisable character. There is a clear need for a central, engaging public area in Winchester, akin to a civic square, and The Broadway was highlighted as the best place for this. It is essential that the urban fabric supports creative and community initiatives and carves out space for local events. 



Participants discussed various aspects of urban planning and community development, emphasising the need for active, adaptable, and inclusive spaces. They highlighted the importance of integrating greenery, supporting independent retail, and fostering multicultural and creative hubs. They noted the challenges of affordability and accessibility, especially for students and small businesses, and stressed the significance of creating vibrant, multi-use environments. Engagement: School Workshops

We held four sessions in May 2024 at primary schools across the Winchester District. These included Harestock Primary School After School Club, St Peter's Primary School After School Club, South Wonston Primary School Eco-Warrior Club and we also hosted a session for St Swithun's School (Year Six) at BellaCrafts.

The workshops, designed and delivered by Kings Walk-based BellaCrafts, aimed to encourage children to think about the place they live and the things they like to do. The children were asked to draw a picture of what they would like see included in the regeneration area and then to model it out of plasticine and place it on a map of the site.

The children came up with varied and inspired ideas and enjoyed the exercise, especially as it was explained to them that all their ideas would be shared with the Design Team working on the project.











Meanwhile: Kings Walk

Work to improve and refresh the Kings Walk area of Winchester has been completed.

The upgrade includes integrating the Nutshell theatre with the Kings Walk Arcade, improving the appearance of the façade and entrance along Silver Hill and enhancing existing open spaces.

In addition to creating a courtyard area – the 'Courtyard Garden' – with seating shared between Kings Walk traders and the Nutshell theatre, the improvement work also included:

- → Repainting of brickwork and replacement of doors to the rear entrances of shops.





Meanwhile: Friarsgate Park - new temporary space

The work to demolish the former Medical Centre on the site began in Autumn 2023 and was completed in July 2024. This has improved public access and enjoyment of the open space and allowed for more archaeological works to be undertaken.

Work includes:

- → A raised platform for community arts and cultural activity
- → Improved views of the River Itchen
- → Space for a commissioned public mural
- → New planters and wildflower planting, enhancing biodiversity in the city centre
- → More enjoyable walking routes through the heart of Winchester
- → New seating and relaxation areas to enjoy the new views of the river

Engagement Output: Integration




Engagement Output: Short-term Meanwhile

We have worked with TurnerWorks to develop a comprehensive approach to meanwhile activities across the site (included later in this document) and are also looking at how the outputs from the youth engagement work can be used in animating the public realm to help drive further engagement.






Engagement Output: Medium-term Project Brief


Engagement Output: Long-term Vision

Friarsgate Car Park



The site of the former Friarsgate car park will be transformed into a micro-consolidation delivery hub, providing a sustainable and efficient delivery option for Central Winchester businesses. This initiative aims to reduce the number of delivery vans loading on the street, reducing congestion and idling in the city centre, and employing zero-emission vehicles

such as cargo bikes and electric vehicles. The hub will minimise duplicated time and mileage typically incurred by multiple couriers by consolidating last-mile deliveries from a range of parcel carrier companies, and adopting a centralised delivery, neighbourhood-scale delivery strategy.

Youth Hub Coitbury House



The ground floor of Coitbury House will be renovated and refurbished to become a youth hub, focusing on creative activities and connecting to Winchester's creative quarter. Minor modifications to the external fabric, such as bifolding doors opening onto the adjacent courtyard, will create an improved arrival experience, while the courtyard will be active with planting, outdoor furniture, and ping-pong

tables. In a city centre with few spaces for young people to relax and spend time, this intervention aims to fill that gap. Additionally, the pedestrian realm will be improved with an art crossing connecting to the pop-up park on the site of the former Friarsgate Medical Centre. There's also potential for a mural on the tower of the adjacent St Clement's Surgery, enhancing the landscape.



Two new pocket parks will be created on The Broadway, replacing the row of car parking bays. This light-touch intervention will include mobile furniture and recycled timber planters, with lighting to create ambience and a bandstand where people can listen to buskers and watch performances. Local groups and actors will be encouraged to take ownership of

these pocket parks,, and programme activities and performances that may take place here.

As a civic square in the making, this intervention on The Broadway will lay the groundwork for future public realm works, testing the proposal to pedestrianise the area and extend the high street experience.

Building on the current success of Middle Brook Street, the public realm will be further activated through a series of light-touch works. A range of sculptural seating options and playful street furniture will create a space that is inclusive and appealing to all ages, while integrated planting along the route will connect pedestrians to the natural environment. Bold floor graphics will draw visitors from the high street, and the relocation of the market to Middle Brook Street will bring new activity. Additionally, dedicated bays for market stalls will be demarcated through floor graphics, creating a clear and legible public realm

Public Realm / Outdoor Activity Area Busket Yard



A new linear park will connect Busket Lane to the Friarsgate pop-up park, running parallel to the River Itchen as a permanent intervention. This proposal aims to connect people to nature and integrate Winchester's waterways into the masterplan by making the river more accessible and improving the pedestrian realm around it. The new linear park will create a

biodiverse corridor along the edge of the site, with planting, lighting, seating, and floor graphics to make this route safe and inviting, and new gateway signage to emphasise arrival from The Broadway. In Busket Yard, a new multi-sports area will be created with various pitches, seating, and planting, allowing activity to spill out into the park to the north.

Transform the Bus Station




Frau Gerolds Garten - Zurich, Switzerland

An alternative proposal for Busket Yard that involves transforming part of the bus station into a garden centre with a café or pop-up food kiosks. Activity could spill out into the yard, with allotments and planters for urban growing, and the site could engage local groups, including the proposed youth hub at Coitbury House. This relatively small intervention would require a light-touch retrofit of the bus station building and low cost furniture and site activation.

Loading Bay Bar





Ester Bar + Restaurant — Sydney, Australia

The Kings Walk loading bay and bin store could be converted into a vibrant café and bar, serving both daytime functions and evening activities to cater to various demographics. This space could operate as an urban room for Winchester, featuring a lively events programme that includes live music and performances, as well as workshops and classes.

Build Temporary Extension on Friarsgate Car Park





Ely's Yard - Shoreditch, London

An alternative proposal to the micro delivery hub on the demolished Friarsgate Car Park, that sees the site transformed into a lively yard space, with food stalls, seating, planting, and festoon lighting. The upper portion of the car park becomes a terrace, with mobile furniture and spill-out space for vendors, while the lower portion becomes an event area, where covered markets and performances could take place all year round. As with the Busket Yard option, this is a light-touch, low cost activation.

Temporary Public Realm Works on **Tanner Street**





Street Interrupted - Hackney, London

The proposed public realm works in Central Winchester could extend to Tanner Street, encouraging activity and connecting nearby meanwhile initiatives (e.g. Coitbury Youth Hub, the Loading Bay Bar, and Friarsgate Yard). This proposal would establish a safer pedestrian realm, with a shared surface for buses and cycles, and allow activities to spill out from adjacent sites to create a bustling, cohesive, and navigable public realm for all users.







Rooftop Bar with Cathedral View






Frank's Café - Peckham, London

The roof of the Friarsgate Car Park could be activated to create a new rooftop bar, with panoramic views across the entire city. This meanwhile intervention would require remedial works to the existing rooftop to make the surface level and safe, and an investigation to ascertain whether lift access could be reinstated, to ensure that the that the rooftop is fully accessible. The bar itself could be a relatively simple structure, with low-cost timber furniture, planters, and lighting.

Transform Multi-Storey Car Park






Peckham Levels - Peckham, London

The lower floors of the Friarsgate Car Park could be converted into workspace, with areas of open-access social and community space, akin to Peckham Levels. This proposal would introduce various scales of studio space for creative businesses and start-ups, and could be rented affordably to support Winchester's emerging Creative Quarter. This intervention would require significant works to make the car park habitable, including new roof and wall insulation, windows, heating and electricity.

Creative Studios in Middle Brook Street Uppers





Netil House — Hackney, London

Some upper floors in Middle Brook Street are currently being utilised as workspace for local businesses. This intervention would build on what is already there and working, and sees more uppers converted into creative studio space. Like the Friarsgate multi-storey car park, these units could be rented affordably to support small businesses and start-ups. This proposal would require light-touch remedial works to the existing building to bring each space to a comparable level.


Next Steps: Passive and Active Engagement

↑ CWR Stakeholders Map






Next Steps: Consultation as part of the Planning Process
