Following the recommendation from Scrutiny Committee on 5 March, a small group of members from the committee met on Monday 14 April to review and discuss the strategic key performance indicators to be included in future quarterly performance reports.

Below is a summary of the meeting.

#### New KPIs

- None put forward at the meeting.
- Cllr Bolton emailed his list of economy focused KPIs after the meeting. Many
  of these were reported and published elsewhere, including in existing BID
  reports or the Quarterly Economic Intelligence reports. Feedback would be
  provided to Cllr Bolton before the next meeting of Scrutiny.

#### Amend or update current KPIs

- Proposal from Cllr Wallace that new homes KPI be updated to show cumulative progress towards 1,000 new homes target. Agreed this would be helpful.
- Proposal to modify the metric on total housing stock at EPC C or above to show total number of properties as well as percentage. Agreed this would be included.

#### Further investigation and conversation

- The group expressed an appetite for a new KPI that measured greening and biodiversity. Leader felt this was a reasonable challenge. Further investigation required on how this might be calculated, e.g. using Govt formula, planning development data or other sources.
- Embodied carbon for retrofit, the group agreed that this would be a difficult area to collect the data to be able to report as a key performance indicator.
- Planning enforcement cases, further detail requested (e.g. numbers by process stage) and be included in current monthly report circulated to members. The group agreed it would be helpful to have a KPI, but this could be included with other performance data already reported to Planning Development Committee. Further investigation was required and would be taken up with the Corporate Head of Regulatory Services.

#### Other comments

 The source or basis of each KPI target be included with the first quarterly performance report alongside the targets.  Members noted following the invitation included in the DSU on 28 March, proposals from Cllrs Lee and Wallace had been received and officer responses against each proposal circulated before the meeting.

A general conversation took place around other sources of data, such as HCC JSNA, DHSC local authority health profiles and economic intelligence dashboard and how these reports align to the Council Plan priorities and support greater understanding.

Web links to each of the above reports were shared with members who were at the meeting.

Suggestions around future in-depth reviews of key service areas or Council Plan priorities to be considered at a future Scrutiny meeting, subject to agreement with the Chair.

Noted that Health & Environment Policy Committee received a presentation in October from HCC Public Health which referred to JSNA and a lot of detailed questions being asked at the time.

Cllr Wallace as Vice Chair of Scrutiny to give a verbal update to the next Scrutiny meeting on 5 June when the Q4 report will also be on the same agenda.

The first quarterly performance report of 25/26 would include progress against the priorities in the new Council Plan 25/30 and agreed set of key performance indicators and considered by The Scrutiny Committee at its meeting on 8 September.
